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1. Approve January Board Meeting Minutes

2. MET Report

Purchase and installation of a new electronic sign on Lincoln Drive will cost ~\$21,000. MET believes that a new sign will be an investment in community outreach and advertising that will pay for itself over the next several years. MET considers a new sign to be a high priority and will continue to evaluate ways to pay for the cost.

Another high-priority near-term expense is installation of an electronic locking system, which will cost ~\$20,000-\$25,000. MET is requesting a working group to convene between MET, Building and Grounds, and Board to discuss path forward for the new locks and sign. Sam



Stormont volunteered to represent the Board on the working group.

3. President's Report

The elevator is making good progress but is waiting on Otis, the elevator manufacturer, to assemble the elevator. We are still on track for the elevator to be functional by the 30-Mar-2019 All Church Dinner. From a cost perspective, we have used the contingency funds and currently do not have enough funding to complete the hoped-for driveway improvements.

Board members are asked to champion the stewardship drive and service auction to encourage participation and giving. We will attempt to engage CSD more in the auction this year. In addition, the Board discussed ways to enable better absentee participation (e.g., online participation).

Assignment: Kent to investigate recruiting an external consultant to assist in leveraging technology to enable remote participation in the service auction.

A major goal for this year is CSD stability and forging partnerships for maximum effectiveness. Time pressures in people's lives are ever increasing. CSD is working with teacher training models, workshops, and engagement of parents (e.g., diversity training for parents, parents' night out). USG needs to adapt to changing times and bring spirit and justice to congregants 24/7, not just on Sunday mornings.



We have been partnering with Springboard Meditation Sangha, POWER, CAMI, and many other organizations to increase effectiveness and impact. We intend to continue to leverage partnerships in coming years. The Board discussed how we can partner with other churches in our music ministry, possibly even for fund raising opportunities.

We previously had a Transformation Team with the objective to assess USG's programming and structure and determine what is working well, and how we can be more welcoming and encourage diversity and inclusion. The Board discussed convening a Building Beloved Community team to continue the momentum initiated by the October 6, 2018 Building Beloved Community retreat.

Appendix 1: February 2019 MET report

Ministry Executive Team Report February 2019

Security Update

The USG Security Team (Beth Lazer, Susan Smith, Rev. Kent, Ryan Hurd, Gloria Guldager) met on Friday, February 8 and focused on evaluating options for emergency response procedures depending on circumstances. The team is reviewing information and continues to sort through various options to take when confronted with an emergency situation so the congregation knows what to do to stay as safe as possible. Discussion included procedures for dealing with circumstances such as a violent individual, bomb threat, and fire, as well as when to shelter in place vs. evacuating. The team continues its important work on this issue. Plans for final procedures are still in development.

In addition, Gloria has been working with Howard Silver to explore options for electronic locking systems. Estimated cost is \$20,000-25,000, which would include all the hardware and software.



Stewardship Circles

As part of the its annual pledge campaign, Stewardship will offer three socials on March 9 and 16. Three USG households have graciously agreed to host a session: Rev. Kent & Kristin Shipler, Eva Finney & Kurt Ahrens, and Shobhi Kanal & Eric Foster. Rev. Kent will be the primary leader of all the sessions and will engage members in conversation to reflect on a number of topics related to the state of the church, as well as the significance of members' important role in helping USG achieve its mission.

ERC Video Collection

We are pleased to report that ERC's video project featuring narrative and interviews has been sent to the Meadville Lombard Theological School's Sankofa Special Collection for research. As noted on the school's website: "The Sankofa Collection serves as a repository of archival materials, biographies, worship resources, and images that tell the story of Unitarian Universalists of Color".

Promotional Video Production

Rev. Kent has been exploring the use of promotional videos to highlight USG and its programs and services. Ryan Hurd has agreed to work with Rev. Kent on how to move forward with this project. They will look at the possibility of hiring someone experienced in video production to work with them for a limited number of hours to make engaging and creative videos.

POWER Anti-Racism Training

USG will serve as host for this important event sponsored by POWER which will be held from March 27-29 in Sullivan Chapel. Forty seats are available for representatives from 60 POWER congregations. USG will have 4 seats.

Membership

Church records indicate there is a 5% drop in membership, from 298 to 283. However, overall church attendance is up and donations remain stable. CSD and SGM attendance remains strong.

Lincoln Drive Signage

MET is moving forward in its efforts to obtain funding for a new sign on Lincoln Drive. Rev. Kent will meet with the Board soon to discuss various funding options. Estimated cost is \$21,000, which includes the sign and installation.

Appendix 3: Roadmap 2018/2019

Unitarian Society of Germantown Roadmap 2018/19

The Mission of the Unitarian Society of Germantown is: *"Building Beloved Community with compassion, service, and empowerment."*

Children's Spiritual Development

Charge: Provide developmentally appropriate education that supports the lifelong process of learning, to cultivate goodness, compassion, empathy, and love for oneself and others. Offer safe and caring spaces for introspective work, connecting to nature, and building right-relationships in community across generations. Put into practice hands-on, experiential education for children, facilitators and parents that cultivates respect, stewardship, service, mindfulness, responsibility, justice, and the search for truth and beauty. To welcome young people into the UU community, help them find their way into becoming active members, and provide them opportunities to learn the rich history and guiding principles of Unitarian Universalism.

Goals:

- Revisit the volunteer teaching model to see if there are alternatives available (clustering teaching assignments).
- Increase youth participation with younger kids in this new volunteer teaching model (Youth Team in Pre-K).
- Continue workshops based on the needs and interests of parents and teachers.
- Support new DSD while he gets settled and bring him up to speed.
- Conduct a teacher workshop in January 2019 -- theme was behavior management and mindfulness in the classroom.
- Conduct a Teacher/Parent Workshop on 1/28/19 co-sponsored by CSD and ERC, theme is Diversity Training for parents and those who work with children.
- Piloting CSD Children's Chapel for some traditional low-attendance days.
- In general, have more blending of classes a couple times during year around a unified topic, i.e. an environmental project in spring.
- Institute a 'parent nights out' (childcare provided for free or nominal fee) i.e. Valentine's Day, and/or maybe one in May when parents are tired of school and activities.
- Promote more active involvement in the Service Auction by teachers and kids.

Adult Spiritual Development

Charge: To provide programs, events and communal gatherings that support members and friends of the Unitarian Society of Germantown in finding spiritual paths that are meaningful and relevant to their individual journeys as well as to the community as it moves forward compassionately in defining, refining and strengthening our Beloved Community.



Goals:

- Continue to develop new programs and spiritual practices to appeal to a wide range of our USG members and friends.
- Continue to develop and foster a robust program of meditation, mindfulness and related teachings involving our partner Springboard Meditation Sangha and hosting nationally recognized meditation teachers.
- Continue our Exploring Elderhood program and help that community take more active ownership of that program and to consider other directions that Exploring Elderhood might take.
- Continue our program of Difficult Conversation and provide a safe, respectful forum where many more of the topics that our members struggle with and sometimes appear to divide us can be explored and where we can learn what positions people who may differ from us may hold and their reasons for holding those views.
- Continue to offer the whole USG Community an annual Community Day wherein we can come together to share and explore new spiritual practices, share an intergenerational celebration of our Beloved Community.

Small Group Ministry

Charge: To support personal and community growth through Small Group Ministry groups.

Goals:

- Have more people use Soul Matters curricula as intended, including those not yet in groups.
- The minister will offer a small group for visitors/new members, could do a personal invite from Kent. Starting in January or February 2019.
- To help Villages connect and experience the SGM program, offer SGM sessions to Villages a few times a year.
- Find ways to introduce curricula exercises and questions in the weekly Spirit to help people engage them.

Social Justice Council

Charge: Broadly serves to plan, facilitate, and coordinate the social justice program for the congregation. The Council also serves to inform and educate congregants about the various social justice activities with the goal of providing meaningful opportunities for taking action in alignment with our UU Principles.

Goals:

- Continue with monthly social justice coffee hour, which was started in September and is scheduled for the third Sunday of each month before the service. These coffee hours are intended to provide opportunities for people to learn about USG social justice efforts, hear from activists working on justice issues of interest, and meet people for informal conversations about social justice work.
- Create opportunities and encourage USG members and friends to become more active in POWER Interfaith. This will include planning efforts and actions within the various POWER



working groups: environmental justice, Live Free, Education justice, Economic justice, and clergy.

• Continue supporting traditional endeavors such as MLK Day, PHIN family hosting, Rebuilding Philadelphia, and standing groups and committees.

Ending Racism

Charge: *ERC* works toward dismantling racism in all its forms, individual, institutional, and systemic, through self- examination, education, advocacy, public witness, and service.

Goals:

- Expand membership.
- Encourage ERC members and USG congregants to address all forms and levels of racism through self-examination, education, advocacy, public witness, and service.
- Continue close connection with UUA racial justice effortshttps://www.uua.org/multiculturalism.
- Continue ERC movie nights.
- Increase awareness about racism within USG through the weekly ERC table, lending library, recommended readings, etc.
- Invite guest speakers to USG.
- Support Coalition Against Mass Incarceration (CAMI).
- Support Men Who Care of Germantown (MCWOG) through participation in efforts to support students and parents at Roosevelt Elementary School.
- Continue collaboration with The Unitarian Universalist Church of the Restoration.
- Organize field trips.
- Host an ERC Open House in the Fall of 2019.
- Premiere excerpts of USG Interviews conducted by ERC on race in congregational history.
- Expand coordination of Ending Racism activities with other Delaware Valley congregations.
- Establish Northwest interfaith links with groups sharing similar goals.
- Host an end of year pot luck.

Worship Arts

Charge: Create worship experience that is spiritually inspiring, rich, engaging, challenging and comforting. Continue expanding roles for drama, movement and visual arts.

Goals:

- Lead congregation through complete review of Sunday services, including structure, sermons, themes, prayers, music, acoustics, visibility, intergenerational services, and special services
- Provide support to Worship Associates with training, communication, and organization.
- Determine future use of the organ.
- Continue to assure that the committee hears the voices of everyone.

Welcoming



Charge: To welcome all and foster continued engagement with USG.

Goals:

- Develop system of assigning "buddies" to active visitors or new members to help them connect.
- Develop new ways of tracking visitors and helping them get engaged by 6/30/19.
- Work on new ways to make sure new members are engaged by 6/30/19.
- Evaluate usefulness of new question, comment, request, suggestion form 6/30/19.
- Reach out to bridging high school seniors with information about UUism wherever they are going and also online. Annually.
- Maintain or increase congregational membership each year. Ongoing.
- Engage more of the congregation in the role of welcomers: welcome table, ushers, tour guides, greeters, etc. by increasing recruiting and simplifying the tasks. Ongoing.
- Help congregants connect with those in their Villages through social events within (All Church Dinner, Fall Potluck, CSD Carnival) and outside of church, caring, carpooling, in addition to Fellowship Hour. Ongoing.
