Spiritual Exercises

- Devotions, when used as a noun, can refer to practices or activities that are undertaken every day and may be spiritual in nature. Ask yourself what act(s) of devotion you already do every day, regardless of whether you consider them to be based in spirituality and no matter how small the actions may seem. Then consider what new act of devotion you could comfortably undertake, and do it every day for a week. Notice how you react and journal about it or talk about it with a friend.
- Find a friend who practices devotion differently than you do. Talk with them about what their experience is like, and if you each feel comfortable, try participating in their act of devotion with them once.

Questions for Contemplation

- Does devotion have relevance or meaning without an object? Or must devotion be *to* something?
- What are you devoted to? How do you show that devotion?
- Does devotion have to be unconditional?
- Do you consider devotion to be a self*ish* or a self*less* attribute? Why?

Sitting in Silence

Take a few moments to sit quietly and reflect upon your thoughts.

Sharing/Deep Listening

Respond with your thoughts/experiences with the topic.

Reflection

This is a time to respond briefly to something another person said or to relate additional thoughts that may have occurred as others shared.
